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YOUNG MERCY LINKS & THE WORLD NEXT DOOR ART EXHIBIT

"The World Next Door' art exhibition, organised by Angela Scarafilo, Young Mercy Links Coordinator, at Melbourne's Mercy Hub, had it's opening night on Monday November 29 featuring a large collection of Naser Moradi's artwork. Naser is a Hazara man from Afghanistan, a self taught artist and unique talent, who is also a detainee in the Melbourne Immigration Transit Accommodation Centre. His works deal with the reality of his own detention, and are filled with hope as he looks towards a future where all are valued and loved for who they are. Did you have a favourite painting from the exhibit?

They are all so beautiful, it's hard to pick just one. My personal favorite though seemed to be unnamed. It includes various shades of red and black and has a girl reaching out to a heart dangling from the sky. To me this painting had a beautiful balance between light and dark, between despair and hope. I love this painting and believe it is an excellent representation of his work overall.

If you can describe the exhibit in one word, what would it be? Breathtaking.

Regardless of people's general reactions or specific emotional responses to particular paintings, everyone was in awe. Some at the beauty, some at the heartbreak some at the perseverance of hope.

How would you describe what Young Mercy Links does to other people who may be interested to take part in what you do?

We are a group of young people who care about our community and want to make positive changes. When acceptable (COVID interferes), we volunteer and host education events. Our group leader Angela supports us in our social justice interests, and we meet to discuss the ways we can help others and educate the community. Recently our focuses have included justice for refugees, climate action and racial equality in Australia. Our work is not limited to these topics and we welcome new ideas and opinions on how we can make a difference.

What message do you think the exhibit brings to the community?

This exhibition was an excellent teaching tool which brought injustices against asylum seekers to the attention of our patrons and community. We demonstrated that the people our government keep in detention can have a lot to offer our society and that no matter how poorly they are treated, hope will prevail. I think the exhibition has also brought a message of hope to the community and inspire people to take action where they can.
