Light a bonfire - a reflection on the Encountering the Sparks Series Jennifer McDowell

The music "River Flows in you" by Yiruma plays softly in the background as I centre myself to do some journalling. The last Encountering session left me with the tools to sit quietly with my thoughts and have a conversation with myself. Through the sessions, I discovered a different way of listening, and became more open to hearing.

I completed a three week zoom series called Encountering Mercy in the Now: Fanning Sparks "the sparks of mercy that started Catherine on her boundary-breaking journey

the sparks of mercy that have started others on their journeys

exploring the ways in which we might break through boundaries or obstacles that repress the flames of mercy which we feel impelled to keep alive"

There were three sessions of two hours, with lived experience speakers, a panel who managed the flow of the conversation, continually connecting us with shared comments in the chat and nurturing a one group dynamic.

There is alot to unpack from the Encounter Series, but a stand out moment for me was thinking of Mercy as a 'verb'. The rich experience of the Sisters, layered against the younger Mercy members activities, reveals a constancy of the Mercy values of compassion, justice, hospitality, and hope.

May that fire burn brightly in all of us.
