### Earth Connection Program by Maria del Mar Scavone & Eli Diaz

Earth Connection is inspired by Laudato Si'goals, a call to action for all human beings to care for our common home - Earth. Most recent sessions had guest speakers on the topic of Ecological Economics and Education at the Mercy Hub.

#### **Ecological Economics**

Jemima Welsh came all the way from Brisbane to talk to us about alternatives to the traditional approach of economics. The 'invisible hand' has made us invisible to ourselves and each other. As a response, the Impact Economy made its way into the economic realm as an alternative to this individualistic approach. The impact economy places value not just on productivity and growth, but also, and to equal degree, on sustainability and wellbeing. It recognises that we are all interconnected, that our financial decisions do have an impact on those beyond our sphere of visibility.

Doughnut economy aims for the economic 'sweet spot'- doughnut, that means we can successfully meet the needs of all human beings within the needs of the planet. However, Jemima emphasised the need of intentionality, mindset, and follow through to really generate a shift in the economy. Looking at this with 'lens of Mercy' and seeing ourselves as interdependent with others, and thus capable of making things better.

#### **Ecological Education**

For this session Sally Neaves brought us an engaging presentation on the need of ecological literacy. She talked about projects related to education in ecology. One of them is the Permaculture for refugees in which the transmitted knowledge is key to meet the basic needs for food, energy, water, shelter and a refugee's concerns for self-determination and self-sufficiency.

At the end of the presentation, she made some trivia-quiz questions on nature-related topics – the older people in the room had more ecological literacy than the younger people (not sure about the unexpectedness of this situation).

With both amazing talks, we went inspired to contribute to the Beach Cleaning Patrol and learned first-hand more about how our actions directly impact nature. Another workshop on sustainable materials also stretched and challenged lifestyle practice.

### **COMFORTABLE CUPPA**



As part of our Comfortable Cuppa series, Adele Howard, gave a much appreciated zoom presentation on Sacred Land, Our Common Home.

'Laudate Deum – Praise God' is a new call by Pope Francis to all people of good will on the climate crisis.

A Zoom session on this theme was led by Adele Howard to over forty participants.

It was a time to enter into the new message (Apostolic Exhortation) which Pope Francis shared with the world on October 4th called 'Laudate Deum – Praise God.'

In the Zoom session Adele reflected on the land as sacred, even as we hold the pain and suffering of those dispossessed of their land through war, particularly in the Middle East and Ukraine, of asylum seekers forced to leave and be deprived of their lands, of land destroyed, rendering people economically poor and homeless, destitute and hungry.

We considered the richness of the Culture of Indigenous Australians and their relationship with the land, which holds meaning, identity and sacred spirit for their clans and communities. We were also aware of the deeply disappointing rejection of the opportunity for formal acknowledgement of the richness of their culture, spirituality and voice in the outcome of the Referendum vote in Australia on October 14.

Adele carried the important thread of awareness and mystery of the sacred in the land through the morning's presentation and discussion as we reflected on the messages and the themes of 'Laudate Deum-Praise God.' It has been called the Pope's cry for a response to the climate crisis as well as an addition and strengthening of urgent messages of Laudato Si'.
